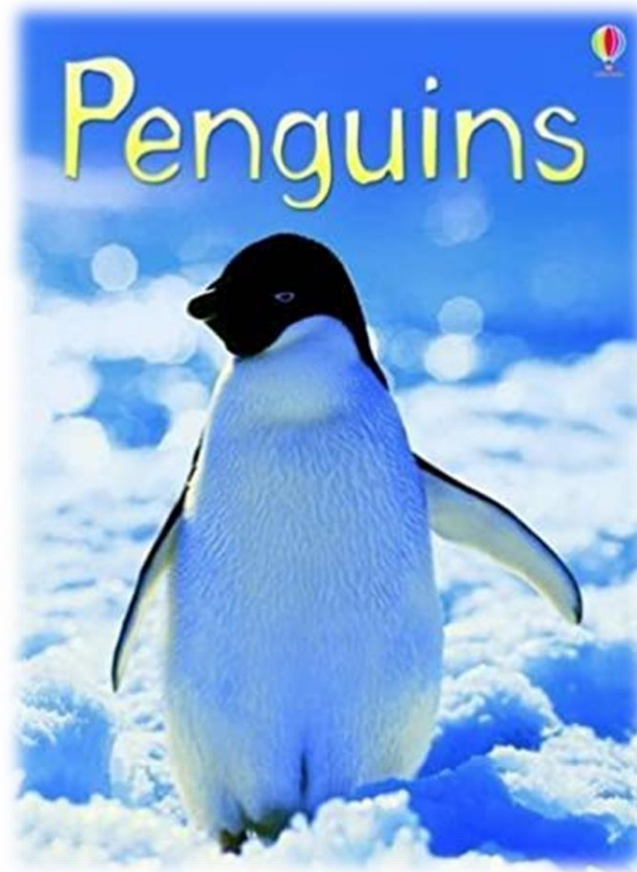


Penguins by Emily Bone

Preening – covering feathers with oil to keep them warm and dry
