




Learning Sequence:

- Name and locate the internal organs associated with the digestive system and describe their functions.
- Name the different types of teeth, looking at their different shapes in relation to their specific job.
- Conduct an investigation into tooth decay caused by certain drinks
- Look at the teeth of different animal groups and how they are different depending upon the diet of the animal.
- Construct, interpret and understand different food chains, describing the role of producers, predators and prey.



Key Skills:

- I can describe the simple functions of the basic parts of the digestive system in humans.
- I can identify the different types of teeth in humans and their simple functions.
- I can construct and interpret a variety of food chains, identifying producers, predators and prey.

Key Vocabulary	
Digest	Break down food so that it can be used by the body.
Oesophagus	A muscular tube which moves food from the mouth to the stomach.
Stomach	An organ in the digestive system where food is broken down with stomach acid and by being churned around.
Small intestine	Part of the intestine where nutrients are absorbed into the body.
Large intestine	Part of the intestine where water is absorbed from remaining waste food. Stools are formed in the large intestine.
Rectum	Part of the digestive system where stools are stored before leaving the body through the anus.

Key Facts and Knowledge:

- To digest food we use a lot of our internal organs.
- Food enters the digestive system through our mouths.
- The mouth has 3 important parts- teeth, salivary glands and tongue.
- Food travels from the mouth, down the oesophagus and into the stomach.
- Adults have up to 32 teeth and children have 20.

Key Vocabulary

Producer	A plant that produces its own food.
Predator	An animal that hunts and eats other animals.
Prey	An animal that gets hunted and eaten by another animal.
